

HCA643 Healthcare Policy, Law, and Ethics

(3 credit hours)

Course Syllabus

Course Description

This capstone course will require students to examine general healthcare administration issues within a framework of legislative issues and their impact on healthcare systems in the United States. Special emphasis will focus on the changes in federal governmental regulations and their impact on quality and financial administrative issues. Through the case study approach involving politics, policy, regulatory environments, economics and ethics, students will critically analyze issues for both healthcare providers and organizations related to corporate governance, personal choice, and regulatory compliance. Topics will include applied ethics, conflicts of interest, allocation of scarce resources, FDA regulations, confidentiality, payment policies, patient rights, data security, professional liability, and global competition.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

1. Demonstrate an understanding of about how laws and ethics work together to provide safe, quality care.
2. Examine the American legal system in regards to how laws are made and who makes them.
3. Inspect the legal structure and governance of healthcare organizations.
4. Analyze the government's regulation of public health and health services.
5. Develop the ability to understand patient privacy and anti-trust laws on healthcare delivery.
6. Interpret the law of tort liability concerning negligence and malpractice.
7. Assess the effects of transparency, full disclosure and their effects on patient/family relationships during the delivery of care and management of untoward events.

Time Commitment

Effective time management is possibly the single most critical element to your academic success. To do well in this online class you should plan your time wisely to maximize your learning through the completion of readings, discussions, and assignments. Because of our accelerated, seven-week term, TU online courses are designed with the expectation that you dedicate a little over **six (6)** hours per credit hour to course activities and preparation **each week**. Learning Activities

The HCA643 course incorporates forums, policy briefs, research papers, slide presentations, and workshop design to foster advanced application of healthcare ethics, law, and policy. These activities are aligned with course learning outcomes and emphasize critical thinking, ethical analysis, legal interpretation, and strategic leadership.

Key assignments include a policy brief on end-of-life care ethics, a compliance strategy slide deck addressing HIPAA violations, a workshop on malpractice risk management, a paper proposing health equity interventions, and a capstone presentation synthesizing all course themes. Together, these tasks challenge students to evaluate, apply, and create real-world solutions for complex healthcare administration issues.

Key Assessment (Taskstream Submission)

This TU course features a “Key Assessment” that provides you the opportunity to demonstrate your program’s core competencies. It also shows how the course fits within the broader curriculum. For this course, you will be asked to reflect on the course and your experiences.
